Crandall Wins Trustee Runoff; Chase Graduation Speaker

Dave Crandall was elected Senior Class Trustee by a wide margin over Chip Visci in the trustee runoff election Monday and Tuesday.

Crandall tallied 62.2 per cent of the vote (166 votes), and Visci received 37.8 per cent (101 votes). Sixty per cent of the Senior Class voted.

THE RUNOFF was necessary when none of the five original candidates received a majority of 272 votes cast in the Feb. 3-4 election.

Crandall received 33.4 per cent in the first election, and Visci polled 20.9. Nearly the same number (267) voted in the runoff as in the first election.

Crandall attributed his victory to his supporters and friends who canvassed for him in what he called a "low-key campaign."

Both candidates complimented Senior Class President Lynne Joanedis and her election committee for a smoothly-run campaign. It was "the best run trustee election in the history" of the office, Visci said.

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Evans and Skip Freeman had 19 points each and steady forward Don Lynam had 18 for Wittenberg, now 18-7 and winner of their last eight starts.

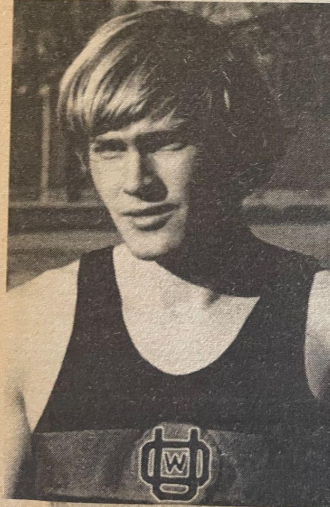
