Professor Enhances Learning with Service

Some teachers like to lecture; some prefer to let the books do the teaching. OWU's Professor Mary Howard has a style all her own. Students will tell you that she does more than teach from a book or a lectern; whenever possible, she lets the world speak for itself. For example, Howard taught a class on the cultural, economic, and political climate of Haiti. Exciting classroom discussions were just the beginning; Howard took her class to Haiti over spring break to see the circumstances they where learning about. The Haiti class reflects Howard's commitment to experiential learning. To this day, she asks students to do something away from class that relates to a classroom topic. In her Health and Illness class students are encouraged to do formal presentations on a health related activity they are involved with. These class projects have included anything from working with the Special Olympics, to community HIV/AIDS activism. Prof. Howard claims that learning about things in context, in addition

to the classroom setting, is one of the best ways to broaden perspectives.

Dr. Howard is not just an advocate of hands-on learning; she is a participant. To shed some light on the often negative and inaccurate stereotypes about the homeless and their situation, Howard tried her hand at documentary making. Wanting to hone her skills as a filmmaker and provide students with the same opportunity; Howard began teaching a documentary film making course with OWU's audio-visual

expert Charles Della Lana. The documentary class gives students a chance to investigate social issues through a camera lens. Students sometimes get to screen their finished work at the Strand Theatre.

Since taking up the camera earlier this decade, Howard has produced two feature-length documentary films about homelessness in the Columbus area. Her most recent film *Swept Out* has become an award winning entry in 2008's Columbus International Film and Video Festival. Homelessness is a key issue for Howard. In her anthropology classes she adroitly explains how the US' cultural flaws fuel the cycle of homelessness and poverty.

Professor Howard hails from Columbus, Ohio and has taught Sociology and Anthropology at OWU since the early 1980's, and is the current Department Chair. She holds a PhD in medical anthropology and wrote a revealing book on malnutrition and poverty in Tanzania called *Hunger and Shame*. She holds that experiential learning enriches students' understanding of the world, leading to a more complex and nuanced perspectives than they had before.


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Where Are The Male Volunteers?

-Part One of a Two Part Investigation

Big Brothers Big Sisters has 23 college women matched with 23 Little Sisters at Willis Intermediate School. There are less than 10 college men serving as mentors in this program. These numbers seem to represent a common theme on campus. Male volunteers are scarcer than at any time in recent memory in our community service programs. This would not be as alarming if there was not such a great need for male role models, especially in education and mentor oriented programs.

For whatever reason though, eligible college men seem to be avoiding community service, a trend that has been growing in recent years. A couple of those interviewed related that they had *thought* about volunteering – tutoring or being a mentor – but they just didn't have enough time. Others seemed to be in limbo – a state of getting ready, to get ready, to volunteer. One wonders what it will take to push them over the edge to actual volunteering? Would it help to know that those students who participate in campus service programs, or serve with agencies gain hands-on skills that make them more marketable to future employers and graduate schools? Would it help to know that you don't have to be popular or talented to make a significant difference in a child's life? That all you need to do is show up, and have fun.

Many of OWU's agency partners desperately need more men to step up to the plate. If you are reading this, and you are a college male who can give as little as two hours a week, now is the prime time to act. The friendly campus community service learning office is located in room 407 of the Ham-Will Campus Center.

This less than scientific investigation will attempt to dig deeper to answer questions about this critical issue. Look forward to next month's entry.

Crop Walk 2008 a Big Success

On Sunday, October 5th, more than 200 members of area churches and twelve campus organizations joined forces to participate in the annual walk for Church World Service. It was an absolutely gorgeous day; perfect for families who could choose the abbreviated one mile walk, and for those who walked the entire six mile route. In either case, both routes led to the First Presbyterian Church, where walkers were greeted with hamburgers, chips and sodas as a small token of appreciation from the walk sponsors. Despite the current economic climate, this year's early pledge count indicates that Delaware will once again give more than \$10,000 to Church World Service, with 25% coming back to the community for our own local hunger fighting agency, People In Need, (PIN).

The acronym CROP stands for "Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty". Church World Service is a co-

Our main goal is to promote Fair Trade practices and to improve the economic welfare of Third World artisans and farmers by marketing their handicrafts. Volunteers In Tax Assistance




