When the phrase "Circle K" is mentioned, most people envision gas pumps and convenience stores. Not many picture cooking and serving dinner to local firemen, leading a kids' activity table at a community festival, or canoeing down a river to pick up trash. Most people do not think of an organization

that provides college students with vast opportunities for service, leadership, and fellowship. To members of Ohio Wesleyan's Circle K, this is exactly what Circle K is all about. Circle K International is the largest collegiate community service organization in the world, with more than 11,000

members in 17 countries. It is sponsored by Kiwanis International, which also sponsors Key Club for high school students. The three main tenets of Circle K are service, leadership, and fellowship, which the members of Ohio Wesleyan University's Circle K strive to demonstrate through service to the community. Some of their projects include the annual Scioto River Sweep, during which members canoe down the Scioto River to pick up trash: Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF (some members even dress up as they collect money in the local neighborhood!);

Bowl for Kids' Sake; and bell ringing to raise money for the Salvation Army. This variety of service opportunities allows every member to get involved with projects they are most passionate about and allows them to interact with many community organizations. Explains Kathryn Seevers, "Circle K is all service, leadership, and fellowship. People coming together for a common cause: making the world a better place for those in need while having fun and helping each other grow into well-rounded leaders. CKI is the perfect outlet through which to develop vourself by helping others."

The Ohio Wesleyan club is part of the Circle K International as well as the Ohio District, which contains clubs from over 20 colleges and universities in Ohio. This state and international network provides ample opportunities to participate in district and international events with members from across the world. "Circle K is different from other college organizations because we have clubs at schools all across the country and we frequently make an effort to socialize and work with these clubs," says Vice President Courtney Hahn. Two of the events that

bring members together are the annual Large Scale Service Project (LSSP) and International Convention, which draw members from across the world. LSSP is a multiple-day event full of service. This August, Secretary Jennifer Federer attended LSSP. "This year I got to go to LSSP and meet other Circle K'ers from across the country! Two hundred of us gathered in Birmingham. AL for a week of service and fellowship. It was an amazing opportunity! The experience truly helped me feel like I belonged to a larger group, a national organization of people who are all united by a common commitment to serve." Ohio's annual district events include the District Service Project, a day-long service event, (the Ohio Wesleyan club is hosting this year's DSP); the Membership Awareness Conference, an event geared towards educating new members about Circle K; and District Convention, during which clubs are recognized for their outstanding work throughout the year.

While members of Circle K come from many different countries, backgrounds, and educational interests, they all share a common desire: to give back to their communities by dedicating themselves to service. Members of Ohio Wesleyan's Circle K have shown this desire by going out into the campus and Delaware communities and striving to make a difference. They have all embraced the Circle K motto: "Live to serve, love to serve."






