Introducing Ohio Wesleyan's New VISTA Volunteer



Americorps, created by President Bill Clinton, is a program of the Corporation for National and Community Service.

The Ohio Wesleyan Community Service Learning Office is excited to announce the addition of Mery Kanashiro, who is serving Delaware this year as an Ohio Campus Compact AmeriCorps VISTA volunteer. Mery is a twenty-three year old from the D.C. area. She is bilingual in Spanish and English, majored in Psychology with a Sociology/Zoology double-minor, and is a first-generation college graduate. She graduated from OWU last spring but will be sticking around for another year to work specifically to learn about homelessness and poverty in Delaware. Mery has found that these two issues are often overlooked, as many assume that Delaware is a mostly upper-middle class college town.

Over the next year, Mery will be working in conjunction with Ohio Wesleyan University, Family Promise of Delaware County, and The Women's City Club. Family Promise is an organization serving homeless families with children in the Delaware area to achieve lasting independence. Delaware churches rotate duties as needed on a weekly basis, providing meals and shelter

for the families they serve. The Women's City Club is a local organization that provides stable housing for low-income, single working women, and it is where Mery is living throughout her year as a VISTA.

Mery is currently building relationships and getting to know the community. She will explore Delaware and its resources for low-income and homeless individuals and will spend time learning about the needs of the partner organizations. The next step she will take will be working with Ohio Wesleyan students to help fulfill needs. A challenge Mery faces is finding sustainable ways to make a difference in the community. She recognizes that she must be careful not to make decisions too quickly and miss the long-term solutions in pursuit of short-term, less sustainable ones. She hopes to plug Ohio Wesleyan students in to the community in a way that will challenge misperceptions both of the town itself and the students who reside in it.

OWU Responds To Global Crisis

The Ohio Wesleyan campus club Horizons International hosted a campus-wide meeting on Thursday, September 10th during which a detailed overview of the magnitude of the floods in Pakistan was presented. Horizons International has taken on Pakistani aid and relief as a priority and would like to be in touch with you if you have any ideas.

Across campus, student groups are coming up with ways to support Pakistan during massively devastating flooding. Groups have had to be quick on their feet to come up with fundraisers and benefits quickly as aid is needed in Pakistan immediately.

During the weekend of September 11th, the Vietnamese Club and Rafiki Wa Afrika hosted two events that benefited Pakistani relief efforts. The Vietnamese Club had a cookout, while Rafiki Wa Afrika hosted a party at the Citizens of the World House. The party was called "Welcome to America" and donations were taken at the door.

On Wednesday, September 15th, Amnesty International will be hosting a burrito bar, where students can order burritos to be delivered to their dorms or to be picked up at the Peace and Justice House. All proceeds will go to Pakistani aid efforts.

As dates for future projects become finalized, keep an eye out for them on campus. Projects like kebab and henna stands have been proposed, as well as concerts with local bands, and dorm storming for food points which will continue throughout the semester.

In collaboration with the Chaplain's Office, Horizons International is serving as the primary facilitator for Pakistan Flood Relief efforts at OWU. The Delaware County Bank has established a special account, "Pakistan Flood Relief." As requested by Horizons, donations to this account will be distributed to three agencies: Doctors Without Borders, The Citizen's Foundation, and Giving Children Hope. Any who wishes to donate directly to these agencies can go directly to their web sites and donate through pay-pal. Agency Spotlight: People in Need, Inc.

People in Need, Inc. (PIN) of Delaware County, Ohio is an organization that provides short-term emergency food, medical, or housing needs to residents of Delaware County. PIN also works with community and government resources to help their clients during the rebuilding process after an unexpected loss, illness, or other finan-

cial emergency. The upcoming Crop Walk event on October 3rd will raise funds and awareness to benefit PIN as a local organization, as well as raising money for global disaster relief and self-sufficiency projects in developing countries.

Since PIN started in 1980, the population of Delaware County has increased by 200 percent, and it's still climbing. With this population growth, PIN has grown to accommodate the number of people in need of their services.

ENVIRONMENTAL INTERNSHIPS AVAILABLE AT STRATFORD ECOLOGICAL CENTER

Stratford Ecological Center has 2 intern positions still open for this fall. One position is an Environmental Education Intern. This person would work Monday through Friday, either 8-4 or 9-5. They will lead school field trips, short inschool presentations, work in the children's garden, and other jobs. This position starts on September 8 and ends on November 12. There is a \$1400 stipend for the term.

The second position is for a Sunship Earth Intern. Sunship Earth is a week-long program for fifth graders where the learn about energy flow, diversity, community, etc., by taking part is hands-on activities. The intern will teach during the program, and will work from 7:30-2:30 pm on Mon, Tues, Wed, and Friday. On Thursday, they will work 7:30 am-8:30 pm to accommodate the evening component of the program. The position starts on September 27 and ends November 19. There is a \$1200 stipend for the program.
