Theory to Practice Grants Allow for Student-Designed Service Learning Projects

Over the summer, Benjamin Andrews, Ahlam Awad, and Heather Werling traveled to several different cities in Eastern Africa on a Theory to Practice Grant project they proposed, called "Affecting the Uninfected: HIV/AIDS Orphans in East Africa" Also on the trip were Paula Travis, the Office Manager for Women and Gender Studies, Black World Studies and the Sagan National Colloquium, and Professor Ali Skandor, a professor of Swahili. For the majority of their time they remained in Kenya, but they also ventured into Tanzania for nearly a week. They made stops at several non-governmental organizations and orphanages, trying to comprehend the prevalence of HIV/AIDS in the local areas and the effect HIV/AIDS has on people in these local areas. Ahlam says the group came up with the idea for the grant by combining their interests. "With Ben and Heather being Sociology and Black World Studies majors who had taken several Swahili classes with Mwalimu Ali (Professor Skandor), and

myself, a biology major who is interested in pursuing my studies in Public Health, it all came together." Ahlam continues, "Since I am from East Africa (Ethiopia), I literally grew up hearing about HIV/AIDS my whole life, and seeing people stigmatized and children dying of AIDS. The prevalence varies from one country to another, but our interest focused on Swahili speaking countries because I personally wanted to see how people living with HIV/AIDS dealt with it in places outside of my country, and because Ben and Heather spoke a little Swahili. Also, Mwalimu Ali is originally from Kenya so our interests were compatible."

The group came prepared with questions. They were interested in finding out how pervasive the stigma attached to HIV/AIDS is for those who have contracted it, as well as learning by what means children taken care of who have been orphaned due to the death of their parents who had HIV/AIDS themselves. As far as accomplishing their research objective, Benjamin says he is certain they learned

a lot, but also says that one month was not nearly enough to gain a conclusive understanding of the situation in Eastern Africa.

Benjamin said he was surprised, when talking to medical authorities and locals, at how many contradicting opinions there are about the HIV/AIDS epidemic. "Assuredly, there are a plethora of ideas here in the States about the AIDS epidemic as well. It was certainly obvious that people are not completely educated about what AIDS even is and how to go about dealing with it."

Heather Werling shared, "One of the most moving moments was when I spoke with a health worker named Patience. She took me on the route that she goes on every week in order to give persons with HIV their antiretroviral drugs. When I commended her on her dedication, she replied that she does this to help others because she truly understands their worries and fears because she too is HIV positive. She then opened up even more and told me her story surrounding getting tested and worrying about if her sons were positive too. The two hours I spent with Patience seemed like they lasted days, and I gained more of an understanding with every minute that I spent with her. I certainly couldn't fully understand her situation, but my experience with Patience enabled me to become more open as a person."

Theory to Practice, continued...

The group's project will continue at OWU. Ahlam says, "Although we visited several, our next plan is to help one specific orphanage in Mombasa. We want to start a donation program for that orphanage. When we left, we were all just too attached to the kids there. Some of the orphans are eighteen or nineteen years old and done with high school, but have nowhere else to go, so they keep repeating the 12th grade since they can't afford higher education."

Benjamin, Heather, and Ahlam will present a poster session and answer questions about their trip on October 20th from 6–7 pm in the Benes Room. Their session will be followed by the Sagan National Colloquium speaker, Dr. Kennedy Walibora Waliaula. They are also in the editing process for a documentary they are making about their trip. In addition, the group is planning a food and clothing drive in order to provide the Mombasa orphanage with some necessities in time for the holiday season.

"Recycled Life" OWU and Global Village Partner in Serving The Safe Passage School

Delaware's Global Village Collection and OWU's Peace and Justice House member, Gabe Quick, are partnering to present the documentary "Recycled Life" on October 24th in the Bayley Room of Beeghly Library. "Recycled Life" documents the struggles of children of the Guatemala City garbage dump. The screening will in part provide information on the products that Global Village carries and how sales of these products can help the children of the Safe Passage School. Global Village Collection carries Safe Passage Guatemalan Coffee from HigherGrounds Coffee Company. HigherGrounds gives a portion of the profit from the sales of this coffee to the Safe Passage School for children from the Guatemala City garbage dump. In addition, Global Village Collection gives a portion of its profits from the sale of all Safe Passage Guatemalan coffee to the school. The goal of the Safe Passage School is to educate children who otherwise would grow up working in the city dump all their lives. Safe Passage wants to break this cycle, and the Global Village Collection wants to help, as well as educate the Delaware community about their efforts.

Ohio Wesleyan Considers Long-Term Service In Haiti (With Help from Students Gretchen Curry and Will Condit)

In August, a delegation of Ohio Wesleyan students and staff visited Project Espwa, an orphanage in Les Cayes, Haiti. Doug Dittrick, who is a member of the Ohio Wesleyan University Board of Trustees and serves on the board of Project Espwa, was a member of the team as well. The purpose of the visit was to gain deeper understanding of the project and

assess opportunities for Ohio Wesleyan students, staff, faculty, and alumni to get involved in a long term program of service learning and servant leadership. Gretchen Curry and Will Condit, a junior and a senior, were the two students who went on the trip.

The experience of going to Haiti and actually see the destruction and the ways those living there cope is one that Gretchen and Will are still struggling with.

Gretchen illustrates the difficulty they still face in understanding their experience in Haiti. "If I had to sum up my three hour experience in Port-au-Prince via a tour from our van, I would say it was uncomfortable, striking, disheartening, literally indigestible, unsettling, and, at times, ironically hopeful. We would pass shanty town communities where

young women my age sat on stools outside their makeshift homes, smiling and laughing with each other. I didn't know whether to feel relieved or completely saddened."

Will shares a similar sentiment when describing the pockets of life surrounded by destruction: "When I think about what I learned, two things come to mind. First, Port au Prince and the surrounding area is still flattened and in a state of complete disrepair months and months after the earthquake. Secondly, the people of Haiti have such an intense will to live. Even in the destruction, they make do with what they have and don't seem to be giving up."



Another experience marked in Gretchen's memory is the group's stay in Project Espwa. She says, "Any person who has ever said, "I want to change the world," should model their work after Project Espwa. The visionary behind the orphanage, Father Marc, is one of the most dedicated people I have ever met. His orphanage, which started in the city of Les Cayes, has grown from about 25 street boys to over 800. They are now located on a large plot of land directly outside the city. Much of the growth of the orphanage can be attributed to Doug Dittrick, an OWU alum who has dedicated much of his energy for more than ten years to this project. Project Espwa itself serves over 3000 meals a day. It serves as a school to not only the boys who live there but to neighborhood kids

as well. There is also a medical clinic, a few gardens, a pig farm, art shops, and a growing number of vocational training programs. They're working on building a girls' home for the few dozen girls who have shown up since the earthquake. When I say this place is incredible, I mean it. Miracles happen at Project Espwa. I've traveled to many countries and I've and shared stories about the dire poverty I've seen, but nothing compares to this." Gretchen stresses that upcoming projects are in the planning stages, but that a long-term relationship with Project Espwa, allowing students from OWU to visit and help out multiple times a year for both short and prolonged stays, is the goal. I have officially been bit by the Espwa bug. After going to Espwa, meeting Father Marc and Doug Dittrick, and spending so much time with some of the boys, I don't think I have any choice but to go back. It's too inspiring of a place to visit just once."

Gretchen and Will are currently applying for a Theory to Practice grant to be able to go back to Haiti and continue the project with the help of other students. Those who are interested should watch for exciting future events to continue with the project.

OWU Alumna to "Run Across Ethiopia"

In January 2011 Claire Everhart will be joining eight other runners from the United States in running 250 miles across the southern part of Ethiopia, running 10 marathons in 11 days. The goal of this ultra marathon is to raise funds for education in Ethiopia. Each runner needs to raise at least \$15,000 to participate. This pays the Tesfa Foundation to be support staff. Team Tesfa is a track-and-field program for youth in Ethiopia that provides safe housing, nutrition and education for young women who are homeless and vulnerable. They also provide vocational skills for young adults. The \$15,000 also goes to the Oromia Cooperative Farmers Cooperative Union (OCFCU) for the building of schools. *On The Ground* is the organization spearheading the multi-organizational fundraiser. On the Ground is the non-profit arm of Higher Grounds Trading Company a fair trade coffee company that is a supplier of The Global Village Collection on Sandusky Street. No funds will go to On the Ground. As the organizer of "Run Across Ethiopia", it will be giving all of the funds to the previously mentioned organizations, Tesfa and OCFCU. the Delaware County Juvenile Court that matches mentors with Delaware county youth who are courtinvolved, as well as with kids who are at risk of becoming court-involved.




