Service-Learning Spotlight on Dr. Richelle Schrock

Richelle Schrock, Ph.D. the director of the Women's and Gender Studies Department, came to Ohio Wesleyan in the Fall of 2008, and has quickly become a very active and involved member of the campus and community. Dr. Schrock says she has been "impressed with our students and their interest in social justice issues." She has been able to connect to the campus passion for community service and has brought this focus into the classroom. Dr. Schrock's re-

search interests include Global Feminisms and Feminist Ethnography, and she is particularly interested in how women work together across cultural divides for social change. Professor Schrock taught a Sagan Course last spring called Gender and Immigrant Experience in which the class took on the responsibility of helping to resettle a Somali refugee family that had just moved to Columbus after living in a refugee camp in Kenya for almost twenty years. The students in Dr. Schrock's course collected all of the material goods the family would need for the first few months of their lives in the United States.

Through the course, Professor Schrock was able to combine her research interests with teaching. "My dissertation research focused on the Somali community in Columbus, so this was an excellent opportunity both for me and for the students. The Somali community is almost entirely Muslim, so the course helped students to examine the complexities of Muslim American identity in the post-9/11 era. "Gretchen Curry, a junior who took Dr. Schrock's Gender and Immigrant Experience class, was impressed by Dr. Schrock's commitment to the course, saying, "Dr. Schrock invested more personal time helping this family get established than she would ever let on. Her dedication to this family was admirable to say the least."

As the director of the Sagan National Colloquium, Dr. Schrock explains that she wanted to highlight OWU's growing focus on educating future leaders to meet the demands of a global society. Students who participate in the Fall lecture series as well as the Spring 2011 Sagan Fellows travel-learning courses will take away a more comprehensive understanding of what active citizenship means in the context of globalization. Dr. Schrock says, "I was very excited to have Gloria Steinem as one of our Sagan speakers and the response to her lecture was phenomenal. Students, staff, faculty members and Delaware community members remarked to me that they felt privileged to have her visit campus and found her lecture informative and inspiring."

Professor Schrock, though relatively new to Ohio Wesleyan, says she has found a home here, in a community with a growing emphasis on service-learning and social justice: "OWU is a place where students are engaged, motivated and passionate about addressing the multitude of challenges we face in the 21st century and that is why I am proud to call it home."

Agency Spotlight: The Humane Society of Delaware County

The Humane Society of Delaware County (HSDC), located just a short drive from Ohio Wesleyan, is a non -profit organization dedicated to finding homeless pets stable, permanent homes. HSDC is independent from national organizations and does not receive any government funding, but relies solely on donations.

In addition to offering care for pets in need of homes, HSDC offers a low-cost spay/neuter clinic for the community to help fight pet overpopulation. HSDC also offers a pet micro-chipping service to animals adopted from HSDC and other pets in the community. On November 13th HSDC hosted a Wellness and Rabies clinic. where people could bring their pets to have them examined by a vet, receive vaccinations for rabies and influenza, be micro-chipped, and be checked for fleas and ticks.

Pet Pals, an OWU club, has paired volunteers with HSDC for several years. Pet Pals volunteers can go to HSDC and walk the dogs or visit the cats, and can help out at adoption events and fund-raising events like the annual Fur Ball, which will take place in February. One of the recent changes someone visiting HSDC might notice is the newly fenced in front lawn, which allows so much extra space where dogs can run. Judy Orahood, who works for HSDC and for OWU says that this was a project in the works for a long time.

"Because we run solely off of donations, ideas like the fenced-in front yard can take a long time to come into being. It's important to give the dogs as much time outside as you can. It keeps them alert."

Dogs left in too-small kennels can become neurotic or depressed and will pace or become lethargic or aggressive. At HSDC, kennels are relatively large and dogs are allowed outside for long periods of time in the pens and runs surrounding the building.

Orahood says, "Dogs are adopted pretty quickly, and kittens also have a good chance of being adopted, but adult cats often take longer. We have cats at the shelter right now that have been there over a year. Because we are a no-kill shelter and do not euthanize for space, we can't accept new animals until others have been adopted."

Some OWU students now work at HSDC, and volunteers from OWU have been a big help for HSDC in the past. HSDC hosts volunteer orientations on the first Saturday of every month at 10 am and the second Thursday of every month at 6pm. The Humane Society of Delaware County, 4920 State Route 37 East, is currently accepting applications for volunteer care staff positions. Individuals who demonstrate excellence will have priority consideration for available paid care staff positions.

Care staff responsibilities include, but are not limited to, all cleaning, care and enrichment tasks for the animal residents. Candidates must be able to lift 50 pounds. Submit availability with letter of interest or application to: managerhsdc@live.com.

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Recent Philanthropy & Social Justice Events on Campus

On October 19th, Peace and Justice House member Celeste Taylor, along with The Global Village Collection, cosponsored a screening of the documentary, "The Dark Side of Chocolate", which chronicled horrific, often unknown aspects of the chocolate industry. The film focused primarily on forced child labor. On October 24th, Peace and Justice House Moderator, Gabe Quick, also partnered with Global Village to present "Recycled Life," a film about Guatemalans living and working in a landfill and the struggle to provide education and care for their children. Students and community members were able to discuss the films and learn about specific products sold at The Global Village which serve to benefit organizations like The Safe Passage School in Guatemala.

On October 21st, OWU students attended the campus's first "Up Til' Dawn" event to support St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee. Each student brought a list of addresses and then filled out letters asking relatives and friends to donate to St. Jude. Alexa von der Embse, who helped coordinate the event, was pleased with how it turned out: "Overall, the event went incredibly well, especially for a first-year event. We had such a great turnout from the entire student body, and we got a lot of positive feedback from a lot of people who had a great time while they were there." Zach Thomson, a former St. Jude patient who lives in Delaware, gave a short speech about St. Jude's impact on his life. Alexa says, "To hear from a young patient about his experiences at the hospital was moving for everyone in the audience, and we

were so grateful that Zach and the rest of his family were able to come and speak at our event."

On October 30th, Nearly 250 students, faculty, and community members attended Rohina Malik's Performance of "Unveiled". The audience gave her a standing ovation and asked thoughtful, probing questions after her performance, in which she portrayed four Muslim women from differing backgrounds and their experiences with discrimination. Chaplain Powers said after the program, "It occurred to me, 'Yes, our world is exploding with religious bigotry and hatred. But here at Ohio Wesleyan University, we offer a distinctly different worldview. Here at OWU, Jews, Christians, Muslims, and people of other world religious traditions live in respectful harmony. We do not do that by accident, but by deliberate intention. It has been a core of our religious heritage as Wesleyan Methodists since our beginning in 1842. Indeed, this open-hearted Wesleyan spirit is imprinted as our middle name."



On November 4th, students held a vigil in remembrance of the recent suicides of LGBT youth. Anthony Peddle, who helped coordinate the event, said ""Holding the vigil on our campus was very important and personal to me. I have personally seen [the effects of] bullying and suicide, and I felt it was an important event to hold to raise awareness of anti-gay bullying and suicide, not only in the LGBT community but in the college community." President Jones and Chaplain Powers both spoke at the event, and students took turns sharing stories of their experiences with suicide, depression, bullying, and LGBT issues. Anthony says he was pleased with the vigil: "Having such a great turn out for the vigil represented the community values Ohio Wesleyan has. OWU has such an amazing staff and student body who are always here for each other."




