### The Columbus Initiative... Entering a 3rd Decade of Promises Kept



Reading Together At Linden

This year, the Columbus Initiative began its third decade of continuous partnership with the Columbus City Schools. This partnership joins students from Ohio Wesleyan University in tutoring and mentoring relationships with inner-city children from one of the more economically-depressed areas of Columbus, Ohio. The mission of the Columbus Initiative is to help meet the needs of our public school partner, Linden S.T.E.M. Academy. To that end, Ohio Wesleyan students have tutored children in most subject areas, listened to children's concerns, dried tear-filled eyes, raised money for books, helped teachers create materials, cleaned the schoolyard, and helped keep peace in the hallways, lunchroom, and playground. When a new school was built, tutors helped pack the boxes and moved them to the new building. When teachers needed additional chaperones for field trips to the zoo or the pumpkin patch, the tutors

volunteered to help. Most importantly, the Columbus Initiative tutors have kept their promise to **Be There** – day after day, week after week, month after month, and year after year.

This partnership has provided hundreds of college participants an opportunity to engage in servant leadership; to work to promote change in the academic experience of urban children; to experience true civic engagement; and to think about and challenge their own ideas about the effects of poverty on education, the role of society as it relates to those who are in need, and the ongoing national conversations about school reform, immigration issues, and healthcare. Ohio Wesleyan provides transportation, tutor training, consistent on-site supervision, and allows

students to access their Federal Work/Study funds while working for the Columbus Initiative. OWU also provides Institutional Work/Study for student participants who do not qualify for Federal funding.

A Final Note: In addition to their work with children, Ohio Wesleyan tutors also learn from one another. The demographics of the Columbus Initiative tutors is generally one third Minority-American students, one third Caucasian American students, and one third International students (usually with 10-15 different countries represented). So each Columbus Initiative bus is filled with a rich array of languages, cultures, and religious traditions. What a wonderful opportunity to for students to engage as citizens of the world and to work together to raise up the level of multicultural competency on the Ohio Wesleyan University campus!

### Small Living Units Engage in Meaningful Service Projects

Ohio Wesleyan Small Living Units (SLUs) are a unique part of the campus culture. SLUs are themed, and members must complete at least one program per semester that relates to the theme of their house. These programs vary widely, from house bonding activities to volunteering; from on-campus viewings of documentaries, to attending conferences and vigils across the country. Many projects in the course of the last year have focused not only on the SLU and OWU community, but the Delaware, and to some extent, the global community, as well.

Gretchen Curry is a junior member of the Peace and Justice House. Last fall, for her house project, she was the primary organizer for the third annual Bodo Initiative Benefit Dinner. The dinner raises money for the non-profit Bodo Initiative organization started by Lydia Spitalny, an OWU alum and former Peace and Justice house member. Lydia started Bodo Initiative after a study abroad experience in Kenya. The non-profit exists under the

umbrella of the Education for the Future Foundation. Bodo Initiative raises money to send students, mostly girls, to secondary school, as schooling in Kenya is free only through primary school. The dinner is free of charge, and a highlight of the evening is the performance put on by Tony West and the Imani Dancers, an African drum and dance group from the Greater Columbus Arts Council. Donations are taken up at the event, and is consistently successful. Gretchen says, "It's really quite incredible to think that in one dinner at Ohio Wesleyan we can provide a child with an education, and not just any child, but someone on the other side of the world! Every year after the event is over I have to take a step back and really reflect on what we at OWU are capable of accomplishing."





For her house project, House of Thought member Emily Knobbe is also thinking globally. She is asking for clothing donations for a yard sale to benefit Heifer International. She says, "Funds raised and donated to Heifer International will be used to purchase an animal such as a llama or sheep to send to a village elsewhere in the world. The wool will help to clothe the people in the community." Emily's ultimate hope is to raise enough funds to purchase the "Knitter's Gift Basket" which includes a llama, an alpaca, a sheep, and an angora rabbit— valuable animals for struggling communities. She is hoping to set up for the yard sale and begin taking donations around late February. She says, "I want this project to bring to light how fortunate we are to be able to clothe ourselves every day, and how over-indulgent we can become in material things without even realizing it."

Glenn Skiles, a member of Women's House, has been volunteering at Capital Care Women's Center in Columbus. She and other students go to the center to escort women from their cars into the clinic as a way of support and distraction from protesters. The center offers women's health services including pregnancy tests and abortions. Glenn explains, "Because these services are so controversial, protesters meet to hold signs, show grotesque images of fetuses and yell insults at the patients." She explains, "I wanted to take on the project of escorting at Capital Care Women's Center because I felt getting involved with the community was an important aspect of programming that is often overlooked. I wanted to do more than spread awareness, but actually get directly involved in supporting a woman's right to choose a safe and legal abortion. I also wanted to create an opportunity for others on campus to see the obstacles women face in getting even a legal abortion, as well as to put a face to individuals which need these services."

A senior member of the Peace and Justice House, Vanessa Lang's house programs have mostly dealt directly with community service. In the fall of 2009, she and two other P&J members sold handmade toys at the Delaware

Farmer's Market to raise funds for future P&J programming. She also volunteered at Grady Hospital in spring 2010. This program was meaningful to her for the connections it gave her to the Delaware community: "I was trained alongside local people from Delaware. While volunteering at Grady, I made connections through interactions and conversations with people, in turn making myself more than just a college student at Ohio Wesleyan, but a fellow volunteer and a person with a shared intent of helping." Last semester, Vanessa volunteered for Family Promise of Delaware. She produced a new brochure for them, and furthered her connection to the community as well as her understanding of service. "Activism stems not only from a global consciousness and knowledge of others, but also a local perspective and acknowledgment of ones direct impact to the immediate environment and culture they are a part of," she says.

Caitlin Kelly, a junior Tree House resident, has been working with AEP Ohio's Shari Zehala and Tim Wells on a CFL Fundraiser Project. The program involves contacting residents of low-income neighborhoods and directors of community facilities, especially those that serve the elderly or infirm, to set up times when students can replace incandescent light bulbs with more energy-efficient compact fluorescent light bulbs. Caitlin explained, "This project connects directly to the mission of the Tree House, for it not only reduces the amount of energy, as a whole, the community is using, but it seeks to help the most marginalized in society by reducing the amount of money they have to pay for their energy. Helping and working with people is my passion, and being able to couple that with environmentalism is a special and exciting opportunity. AEP is looking for OWU



students to get involved with this program, which they hope will be on-going. If you're interested, contact Tim Wells of AEP at tjwells@aep.com. His phone number is (740) 368-7139.







#### I (and Delaware County) Need Your Help, OWU!

Much of my work here in Delaware concerns issues of local homelessness and poverty alleviation. To that end, I am working with Rosie Porambo, (a non-traditional student here at OWU), the director of Concerned Citizens Against Homelessness and Jennifer Dunkle, director of Family Promise of Delaware County. We are planning a **Homelessness Awareness Film Festival**, to be followed by a **48 Hour Homelessness Challenge** where students and community members will take on the role of being homeless for two days. We will kick off the challenge with the Film Festival on April 10th at the Strand, where we will have movies touching on issues of homelessness, including Dr. Mary Howard's own documentary, *Swept Out*, followed by a panel discussion. After the film festival, those who are interested will begin their 48 hour homelessness experience

This challenge will be taking place over Monday and Tuesday, April 11th and 12th. Of course, we encourage you to go to your classes and participate as a student. Homeless individuals still work, attend classes, and more. It won't be easy, but if we get even five people to do this event we will be happy. The reason Rosie also chose Monday and Tuesday is because those are the days when most of the agencies in town offer their services. For example, there are no opportunities for free meals on weekends in Delaware. If you are a student of Dr. Mary Howard's, please be aware that this can be an opportunity for extra credit for you if you assist with this event. We hope that you will join us and help in whatever way you can to make this opportunity a reality.
