

2024 Sherwood Dodge Shankland Award for the Encouragement of Teachers

DR. ASHLEY KENNARD Assistant Professor of Journalism and Communication

Since she arrived at OWU, **Dr. Ashley Kennard** has taught ten communication courses, supervised multiple independent studies and directed readings, and served as faculty for OWU's Summer Bridge Program. Dr. Kennard serves on OWU's Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion (DEI) Council and is co-chair for the biennial Melvin Van Peebles Symposium.

In the classroom, "Dr. K," as her students fondly call her, doesn't just teach students; she engages and encourages them, challenges them, and inspires them. A colleague once said that "she demonstrates the hallmark characteristics of intellectual curiosity and is a person we could all learn from." Dr. Kennard teaches the whole student and recognizes individual struggles as well as individual strengths.

She's known for the rigor of her courses, holding students accountable for their learning, but students also hail her approachability and flexibility—something not easily achieved. Advocacy and activism are central to Dr. Kennard's research, as evidenced by her work on intercultural and conflict communication, and her pedagogy is DEI work in action.

In 2023, she was honored with the Ohio Communication Association's Distinguished New Teacher Award. Dr. Kennard is an exemplary teacher-scholar who remains committed to her students, is steadfast in her pursuit of social justice and higher learning, and is truly a treasure to OWU.

2024 BISHOP HERBERT WELCH MERITORIOUS TEACHING AWARD

DR. GORAN SKOSPLES

Robert L. and Mary C. Milligan Associate Professor of Economics and Business

Dr. Goran Skosples is a passionate teacher and scholar who lives and breathes the principles of the liberal arts education. He has helped numerous generations of students realize connections between the classroom and the real world, and helped them find their place in it.

Dr. Skosples' main area of research deals with institutional changes in post-communist countries of Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union, and he has published work on the ability of firms to access finance in informationally opaque environments. However, Dr. Skosples believes that Economics is what economists do, and his research interests have spanned studying the impact of internet access on employment during the COVID pandemic, the impact of solar farms on nearby property values, and the effect of fatigue on soccer players following their participation in the 2022 World Cup in Qatar.

He enjoys supervising independent studies and collaborating with students on his research projects. Dr. Skosples organizes the annual Economic Outlook Conference at the University and is an active speaker to Central Ohio organizations about the state of the economy. He was also instrumental in creating the Quantitative Economics major, which was the first science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) major in the social sciences at Ohio Wesleyan University.

Adam Poe Medal and 2024 Welch Award for Scholarly or Artistic Achievement

DR. JEREMY BASKES Professor of History 1993 - 2024

Born in Chicago, **Dr. Jeremy Baskes** began his career at Ohio Wesleyan University in 1993. Baskes completed a B.A. in Spanish in 1983 at Grinnell College, where he became committed to the value of a liberal arts education, a quality that attracted him to OWU. He spent his second semester of junior year studying in Seville, Spain, a life-changing experience that influenced his career ambitions and shaped his approach to teaching. In 1987, Baskes obtained an M.A. in Latin American Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and then enrolled in a doctoral History program at the University of Chicago, culminating in a 1993 Ph.D. In August of that same year, Baskes joined the OWU faculty, where he has taught for 31 years.

Baskes' teaching fields are geographically and temporally broad, encompassing all of Latin America from the pre-Hispanic era to the present. He has greatly relished the opportunities to introduce decades of students to the exciting history of Latin America, offering a wide array of courses from an introductory survey of the region to courses on Mexico and South America examining both the colonial and modern eras. Topical seminars have explored the Spanish Conquest of America as well as the causes and consequences of Twentieth-Century revolutions in Mexico, Bolivia, Guatemala, Cuba, and Nicaragua.

Baskes has served on many faculty committees during his time at OWU, including the Faculty Personnel Committee and numerous stints on the Academic Policy Committee and the Curriculum Committee. He also created Latin American Studies, an interdisciplinary major focused on the region's language, history, politics, and culture. Baskes also envisioned, helped launch, and headed the Global Scholars Program, which recruits top-notch students to OWU to focus their studies with an international lens. In 2020, the program was renamed the Thomas and Susan Palmer Global Scholars Program following the Palmers' gift of \$2 million. Importantly, Baskes ensured that the Latin American Studies major and the Global Scholars Program required students to study abroad, with the hope that OWU students, too, will be positively inspired by such experiences.

Baskes is the author of two books, both published by Stanford University Press. Published in 2000, *Indians, Merchants, and Markets* explores the economic relations between Spanish merchants and indigenous peasants in eighteenth-century Oaxaca, Mexico, challenging the conventional belief that their dealings were purely coercive. As Baskes argues, Oaxacan peasants were shrewd judges of their economic interests and succeeded in extracting benefits in their market activities, especially the production of cochineal dye, Mexico's second-largest export product. A Spanish translation of *Indians, Merchants, and Markets* will be collaboratively published later this year by three universities in Mexico titled *Comerciantes, indígenas, y mercados*.

Baskes' second book, *Staying Afloat*, was published in 2013 and examines transatlantic commerce in the eighteenth century, most centrally Spain's trade with its Spanish American colonies. Traditionally depicted as a highly regulated system in which wealthy merchants earned monopoly profits, Baskes argues that historians have failed to consider the elevated rates of risk that such commerce entailed, from inclement weather to piracy to highly volatile markets. Indeed, merchants often enjoyed large returns, but these were countered by occasional ruinous losses. Profitability was neither guaranteed nor extravagant. In addition to these books, Baskes has published numerous refereed articles and more than two dozen book reviews.

In retirement, Baskes looks forward to pursuing his favorite pastimes: travel and food (cooking and eating). Indeed, his newest scholarly project explores the diets of dockworkers in the city of Cádiz, Spain, in the 1760s. Fortunately, this will require Baskes to travel to Spanish archives to read about food during the day and explore Spanish restaurants and culture at night.

KELLY MCFARLAND STRATMAN, B.A.

League of Women Voters of the United States

Kelly McFarland Stratman is the chief of staff and interim co-CEO for the Washington, D.C.based League of Women Voters of the United States. She has more than 25 years of nonprofit leadership experience, with a focus on fostering innovation and transformative change.

During her 21-year tenure in the League of Women Voters (LWVUS) national office, McFarland Stratman has held multiple leadership positions, most recently working to foster organization-wide culture change for the nonpartisan, grassroots nonprofit through governance, strategic planning, and diversity, equity, and inclusion.

McFarland Stratman also has worked in the League's membership/field support area, building capacity among the organization's 750 volunteer-led leagues, and she has managed major LWV initiatives including the Membership and Leadership Development program, the Citizen Initiative for Transparency, and Local Voices: Citizen Conversations on Civil Liberties and Secure Communities.

Before joining the League's national office, McFarland Stratman served as executive director of the League of Women Voters of Ohio, where she managed the state office, coordinated lobbying activities, and managed grant-funded citizen education and advocacy efforts, including leading a redistricting coalition and ballot initiative.

She holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Manhattanville College in Purchase, New York, where she was a double major in international studies and Asian studies, with a focus area in international management.

McFarland Stratman is a certified association executive (CAE) through the American Society of Association Executives (ASAE) and is a member of the association's CAE provider committee, a governing body that works on professional development credentialing. She also sits on the board of AFS-USA (formerly the American Field Service), a leader in intercultural learning that offers international exchange programs in more than 40 countries.

Prior to joining the League, McFarland Stratman lived and worked for four years in Japan, where she leveraged her academic background in international relations while working in a regional Board of Education.

NOTES ON ACADEMIC DRESS

The history of academic dress reaches back to the early days of the oldest universities. A statute of 1321 required all "Doctors, Licentiates, and Bachelors" of the University of Coimbra to wear gowns. In England during the second half of the 14th century, the statutes of certain colleges forbade "excess in apparel" and prescribed the wearing of a long gown. It is still a question whether academic dress finds its sources chiefly in ecclesiastical or civilian dress. Gowns may have been considered necessary for warmth in the unheated buildings used by medieval scholars. Hoods may have served to cover the tonsured head until superseded for that purpose by the skull cap. The cap was displaced by a headdress similar to ones now recognized as "academic."

European institutions continue to show great diversity in their specifications of academic dress. However, when American colleges and universities desired to adopt a system of academic apparel a half-century ago, they worked out a system that all might follow. The code for academic costumes now in effect was approved by the Committee on Academic Costumes and Ceremonies appointed by the American Council on Education in 1959. The following information is taken from that code.*

GOWNS. The gown for the bachelor's degree has pointed sleeves and is worn closed. The gown for the master's degree has an oblong sleeve, open at the wrist, with the sleeve base hanging down in the traditional manner. The rear part of the sleeve's oblong shape is square cut and the front part has an arc cut away. It may be worn open or closed. Bachelor's and master's gowns have no trimming, but the doctor's may be faced on the front with black or colored velvet and with three bars of the same across the sleeves. If color is used, it is the color distinctive of the subject to which the degree pertains, and it matches the edging or binding of the hood. For all academic purposes, including trimmings of doctors' gowns, edging of hoods, and tassels of caps, the colors associated with different subjects are as follows:

HOODS. Hoods are lined with the official color or colors of the college or university conferring the degree. The binding or edging of the hood is a color distinctive of the subject to which the degree pertains.

CAPS. Mortarboards are generally worn as part of the academic costume. The long tassel fastened to the middle point of the cap's top is either black or the color appropriate to the subject. It is customary for degree candidates to wear the tassel on the right side before degrees are conferred and to shift them to the left when the degrees are awarded. This custom is in some respects a substitute for the individual hooding.

THE UNIVERSITY SEAL OF OFFICE AND THE ORIGINAL UNIVERSITY HANDBELL

The Seal of Office worn by Dr. vandenBerg was designed by Mr. Reveley G. Beattie, a former trustee, and a member of the jewelry firm that made it. The seal symbolizes administrative responsibility and is suspended from a chain, the links of which are copied from a chain-mail surplice. A laurel wreath, ancient symbol of a chief executive, surrounds a replica of the official seal of the University and is quartered by keystones, representing the broad divisions of a liberal arts education. Two medallions are set in the chain above the presidential seal, one of which carries a replica of the tower of University Hall, surrounded by the motto: "Christ the Chief Cornerstone." The other seal is a reproduction of the globe with the inscription: "Serving All Mankind Worldwide."

The Commencement ceremonies will conclude with the ringing of the handbell first used in 1842 to call classes to order. It was presented to the University in 1941 by Nicholas Jones, grandson of the original owner, on the 100th anniversary of Founders' Day. It will also be used as a part of the opening Convocation in August.

PHOTOGRAPHY AT COMMENCEMENT

Ohio Wesleyan has several professional photographers and videographers in place at Commencement. Please remain in your seats during the ceremony to allow the professionals access to all areas. Family photos can be taken before and after the ceremony.

A professional photographer from Graduation Foto® will take a color photograph at the backdrop as Dr. vandenBerg presents the diploma to each graduating senior. Each graduate will receive a photo proof approximately one week after Commencement, and may order prints directly with the studio or through GraduationFoto.com. There is no obligation to purchase prints, and graduates pay no charge unless prints are ordered.




