During his time at Ohio Wesleyan, Jim was active in Greek Life, a Resident Advisor, SUBA, and Council on Intercollegiate Athletics. Jim's connection to OWU goes all the way back to his childhood in Delaware, OH, and in the fifty years since he graduated, Jim has worn many hats in service to his alma mater. Most recently, Jim serves as an Alumni Partner, a Chapter Advisory Board Member for Phi Delta Theta Fraternity, Co-Facilitator for OWU Lifelong Learning Institute, a member of The Bishop Backers, and a Reunion Committee member for the Class of 1973's 50th Reunion.

I once had to give a speech in front of 3,000 transplant surgeons, and I went back to the fall of 1969 to

Speech 10. I remember what Dr. Eliopoulis told me: 'Mendenhall, what are you afraid of? Tell them what you have to say. Just get up there!' I can go on and on about these professors, these people who said, 'Jimmy, you can do it.' It was there, and I just had to have someone encourage me. That's where my love and my thankfulness for being an alum comes from."

What are you most excited about for OWU's future? I am really excited about the new president. I'm excited about what I've heard and read, and I've seen his energy and his passion. I think Ohio Wesleyan today is poised for major and good changes. I'm excited about the future and that OWU is trying to gauge where it's been and where it wants to go to be a premiere, national liberal arts institution.

**Do you have a favorite event to attend as an alum?** Anything that brings alums back together! Alumni Weekend, Homecoming, and PhiUnion for Phi Delt annually are the first to come to mind. I'm really excited for this upcoming alumni weekend. You get one chance at a 50th. I never would have believed in September of 1969 that I'd be here today.
